Road Vehicle Standards Legislation

The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Cities and Regional Development has advised changes to the Road Vehicle Standards (RVS) legislation regarding importation of vehicles, has been delayed beyond the December 10 2020 date set some time ago.

"...the Australian Government has made a decision to introduce legislation that, if passed by Parliament, will delay the commencement of the Road Vehicle Standards (RVS) legislation. This follows an extensive stakeholder consultation process during which the Government has received a strong message from industry that more time is needed to fully understand the end-to-end processes under the new regulatory structure. Pushing back the commencement date will provide more time for industry and governments to plan and implement changes to their business practices to ensure a smooth and seamless transition to the new legislative framework. Postponing the commencement of the RVS legislation will also give the Government additional time to finalise its own regulatory business processes, including IT systems support and to provide the guidance required by industry stakeholders."



The date for next year's Classic Car Show has been confirmed as Sunday, March 8th. Building on the success at the Ascot Raceway venue, the event will be held there again, with some changes being planned to the layout and content. Stay tuned for updates.

Single Car Impromptu Runs

There remains some misunderstanding in certain clubs about how the Single Car Impromptu Runs for cars on Code 404 Concession are meant to be handled.

The concept of this, introduced by the Department of Transport in the new handbook in December 2016, was to provide a simple method for owners of vehicles to take them on runs which do not fall into the category of a formal club event or road test - and is not intended to replace either of these.

It's actually a great system, which is very easy to use.

The Handbook says after detailing normal club runs: "however use of a vehicle participating in an impromptu event involving one, or more vehicles may be acceptable, and must be recorded in your club's official 'Run Log'."

The CMC has sought clarification of the system and has advised clubs of how this should operate. Unfortunately for members of some clubs, there has been a lot of additional and unnecessary complication added by their clubs.

A club member wishing to use their car for such an event needs to advise their Registrar or Secretary (depending who in the club handles this) in writing of the following:

- 1. Identify themselves
- 2. Identify the car they will be using
- 3. Advise the date of the Impromptu Run

That's it. Nothing else is required. Email is acceptable. There is no minimum time limit as to when advice must be provided.

One club I'm aware of was asking members to complete a form requesting 15 items of information including times, destination and reason for the run. None of this is required.

Some clubs have been advising members that they need to carry a copy of the completed form or confirmation in the car for the journey. That's also not a requirement either.

The Registrar or Secretary is obliged to maintain a Run Log, which simply records the 3 items of information the car owner is obliged to provide. They do not have to confirm back to the car owner.

There is no limit to the number of times a vehicle can be taken on an Impromptu Run, though if it were to happen every day or very frequently, it would raise a red flag to the club of a member's inappropriate actions.

It has been brought to the CMC's attention that one club was advising a member he couldn't take his car on an Impromptu Run. Unless a car or member is non-compliant with Code 404 regulations (eg: a car has been modified or expired membership) advice of cars going on Impromptu Runs is not something that a club should be making decisions about accepting or rejecting. The club's obligation is simply to record the details as outlined in the Handbook.

The Handbook also notes that an Impromptu Run may not be used for a driving test.



National Road Transport Hall of Fame in administration: investigation finds financial irregularities

The Northern Territory's National Road Transport Hall of Fame is in trouble after it was found that since 2010 the association has not complied with requirements to provide financial statements at their AGM.

The NT Government has been investigating and has found the association has failed to act in accordance with the Northern Territory Associations Act and its constitution. Apparently the Treasurer and CEO falsely purported to report on the financial status of the association.

"Compliance officers sought to engage with the management committee to achieve compliance, however, financial statements were not presented to an AGM nor were they lodged," the Government's report said.

Established in the mid-1990s, the Alice Springs Road Transport Historical Society oversees the Road Transport Hall of Fame, the Kenworth Hall of Fame and the Old Ghan Heritage Museum. They also host the annual Truckies Reunion which attracts thousands of people.

The management committee was dissolved and the chief executive and site manager, tendered her resignation. Volunteers are keeping the facility open on a temporary basis, with hopes for the future. A statutory manager has been appointed by the Government to oversee the governance and finances.

This should serve as good warning to clubs and associations to act in accordance with regulations.

Motor Museum of WA - The CMC Connection

2020 will mark the 25th anniversary of the Motor Museum of WA. The museum grew out of a great deal of work by members of the Combined Car Clubs (later its name changed to the Council of Motoring Clubs). The trigger was the then Government deciding to sell off the cars from the WA Museum which had mostly come from Percy Markham's collection as a part of the notorious 'WA Inc' fund raising activities. The CMC had organized a demonstration parade of classic cars to Parliament House, met with politicians and gained considerable momentum, however the Labor Government would not be persuaded.

There was a groundswell of discontent in the old car movement as a result of these cars being lost to the state. The result was a group formed by the CMC to look into what would be necessary to create a state automotive museum, which could include the remnants of the collection the WA Museum owned.

Various plans and venues were considered (including the Old Swan Brewery site and in Fremantle) and after years of discussions, planning and work from 1988, the Whiteman Park outcome became possible. An agreement was made between the Combined Car Clubs and Whiteman Park in 1991, achieving Government support in 1993.

The late Maurice Brockwell was the chairman of the committee which instigated the museum, along with Don Stevens, Paul Blank, Terry McGrath, Dennis Lingane, Dave Reid, Kelvin Ferris and Nevis Dowding who all saw the museum through to its opening (and some beyond), each having put in enormous effort. Of course, many others assisted along the way. A Trust was then set up so the museum could operate as a stand alone entity, which has operated the museum ever since.

The official opening took place on April 2nd 1995, with the Hon Richard Lewis, Minister for Planning & Heritage doing the honours.
